All of them strongly agreed that the instructor could effectively and clearly present the content. As the instructor was perceived as engaging by over 90% of the participants, all teachers stated that they

More than 83% of participants were reported to know more about the relationship between the rule of law and national security after the tour. Majority of them also agreed that they have a role to play in safeguarding homeland security as a member of the community.
